
Why do birds strike windows?

DAY

Windows can reflect the sky, trees, and landscape, making the glass invisible.


NIGHT

Lit windows can attract birds and confuse or divert them from their regular path.




Territoriality

Birds like American Robins are notorious for mistaking their reflection for another bird invading their space, and will repeatedly bump the glass to nudge their competitor along.




How can I help?



High visibility decals, one-way window film, or window tape make window surfaces more visible. Shop window products online at **shop.spca.bc.ca**



Drawing designs on the window with wet bar soap will leave a residue that cuts reflection, or shiny Mylar tape streamers will deter birds from flying too close.



Mesh frames create a barrier, and the taut material allows birds to harmlessly bounce off.



Bird feeders should be placed very close (less than 1m) from windows to minimize collision chances.

A bird struck a window

If you find a bird that has struck a window, note any obvious signs of injury while containing the bird in a cardboard box with air holes and a secure lid.
