

Animal Careers Match

Overview:

This activity highlights some Animal Careers at the BC SPCA to engage students in exploration of potential careers with animals. By thinking about their skills, talents, and interests, students will find a match to an appropriate animal career, and then complete a career path diagram to understand what education, training and skills are needed to achieve that career path.

- Key Questions:**
- What are my skills, talents, passions and interests?
 - What do I want from a future career?
 - What are some possible animals careers that I can further explore?

- Big Idea:**
- Matching your skills, talents and interests with a career will lead to a fulfilling adult professional life.
 - There are many diverse and rewarding careers working hands-on with animals, or in the service of animals.
 - Every career path requires some combination of education and training.

Activity:

1. Lead students in a discussion about each animal career explored in the presentation. What skills does each career require? Education or training necessary? Any other requirements, such as a drivers license or certifications?
2. Have each student complete a careers matching survey. This will match them with one or more of the animal careers highlighted.
3. Once matched with a potential animal career, have students complete the career path graphic organizer. Students should be encouraged to use the [additional resource package](#) to complete the path, but may also need to search online to understand the options available for each career.

Modifications:

- Students may already know of a career they are interested in and will want to pursue this option instead of the ones listed. Allow choice when investigating careers as the intent is to help each student develop a career path that suites their talents, skills and interests.
- For students with text difficulties, read the options aloud as a group and then send the selected skill to them to avoid overloading them with information.

Extension Activities:

- Investigate some other careers in fields related to animal welfare, such as Public Policy or Animal Welfare Sciences.
- Have students research local animal services and find a professional in their area that they may be able to connect with as a mentor or job shadow opportunity.

Animal Career Self-Assessment

**If you got more As, you could be an:
ANIMAL SHELTER MANAGER!**

An Animal Shelter Manager is responsible for day-to-day operations. You act as an information resource and ambassador to clients, the general public and staff. In this leadership role, you are responsible for the implementation & monitoring of programs to improve client service, animal care and profitability.

Required Skills and Training:

- Strong management and planning skills
- Forward thinker, and ability to innovate and improve systems
- Excellent interpersonal skills, tact and discretion
- Ability to deal with emotionally charged situations in a calm, professional manner.
- University degree in business management or relevant discipline, plus one year's experience

**If you got more Bs, you could be a:
FARM ANIMAL CARE SPECIALIST!**

A Farm Animal Care Specialist is in charge of farm animal care at one of our rescue barns. They are responsible for the health and welfare of abused or neglected animals. They must have knowledge of housing standards, common health problems and nutritional needs.

Required Skills and Training:

- Good reporting and observational skills
- Strong knowledge of farm animals, housing requirements and nutritional needs
- Problem-solving and critical thinking skills
- Excellent organizational skills coupled with the ability to multi-task and pay attention to details
- Post-secondary education in agriculture, agri-business, food science, animal sciences/ biology

If you got more Cs, you could be a: HUMANE EDUCATOR!

A Humane Educator works to improve the lives of animals through educational events and works collaboratively with a team of educators to create and plan BC SPCA programming for youth and adults.

Required Skills and Training:

- Adaptability and ability to multi-task, patience and professional
- Exemplary organizational skills, attention to detail
- Demonstrated customer-service skills
- Work in a positive and professional manner, independently and as part of a team
- Strong oral and written communication skills; able to speak confidently in public
- University degree in education, social work, or animal welfare

If you got more Ds, you could be a: FUNDRAISING DEVELOPMENT OFFICER!

As a Development Officer you need to be a motivated and innovative problem-solver, who will thrive in a fast-paced work environment. You will be responsible for building relationships with donors and stakeholders, and can demonstrate an understanding of the “big picture.”

Required Skills and Training:

- Adaptable, team player, and comfortable with change
- Clear and persuasive communication, both written and oral
- Accurate record keeping, using data to support initiatives, and to demonstrate success, need or areas of concern.
- Drafting correspondence, responding to emails, forwarding information packages.
- Ordering supplies, filing, and research and planning for future events.
- University degree in relevant discipline plus one year’s experience

If you got more Es, you could be a: WILDLIFE REHABILITATOR!

As a Wildlife Rehabilitator you are responsible for the care of small to medium size mammals and birds. You must have an extensive knowledge of animal care and common medical treatments for wildlife. You must be familiar with provincial and federal government wildlife regulations and rehabilitation permit requirements.

Required Skills and Training:

- Comfortable working in in all types of outdoor and potentially hazardous conditions
- Requires substantial physical labour (must be able to lift 50 pounds)
- Must be able to work in emergency situations, on short notice
- Strong teamwork skills and work ethic
- Excellent communication skills
- University degree in Biological Sciences, Animal Health Care, or a relevant field; Canadian Veterinary Association accredited courses preferred.

If you got more Fs, you could be an: ANIMAL PROTECTION OFFICER!


This position requires a demonstrated knowledge of federal, provincial and municipal laws and regulations regarding animals, animal welfare and related activities.

Required Skills and Training:

- Excellent communication, negotiation and mediation skills
- Information gathering: determining what you'll need, sourcing it, analyzing, and reporting
- Ability to keep information confidential
- Strong customer service, interpersonal and presentation skills
- Flexible schedule, and able to work weekdays, weekends and statutory holidays
- Post-secondary coursework in social sciences, criminology/law; prior experience in a relevant field, such as law enforcement
