Directions: Harry the rabbit is looking for a home and family to call his own. Can you help him? Complete one, several, or all of the following activities to help him find the very best home!

Activity 1: Create an Adoption Poster



Have a good look at Harry's adoption profile and the rabbit care guide (in additional resources). Pick out all of the information you think potential adopters should know about him. Create a colourful, eye-catching adoption poster!



Activity 2: Design a BUNbelievable home!

Draw (or build) the best bunny home so your adopters know what to provide for Harry! Use the rabbit care guide and bunbelievable home checklist to make sure you include everything Harry will need.



Activity 3: Choose a Family for Harry

Applications have come in! Use the rabbit care guide and Harry's adoption profile to choose the best home for him. Why did you choose that one over the others?



Activity 4: Lets Hear from Harry!

Put yourself in Harry's paws. How is he feeling with his new family? What does he like about his new home? What is he excited about? Choose between writing a journal entry, making a comic strip, or writing a skit to help Harry express his feelings.

Please provide the animal care guide in the resource package for activities 1, 2, and 3. It's best to give your child activity 3 when they finish activities 1 and 2.








Meet Harry

Harry's Story

Harry was purchased from a pet store as an Easter gift last year. Unfortunately, his guardians were not prepared for the cost and time required to care for a rabbit. When they became bored of him, they planned to set him free in a local park!

Thankfully a responsible neighbour heard about their plans to set him free and brought Harry to the BC SPCA instead. Now he is being cared for in the shelter, hoping to hop into a forever home soon!

Adoption Profile:

- 1 year old Holland Lop
- Neutered male
- Lifespan 10-15 years
- · Good with adults and children 12 or older
- · Does not like to be held or picked up
- · Needs space to hop and explore for most of the day
- Scared of loud noises and larger animals
- · Has had a few eye infections and will need regular visits to the vet

Billions and Billions of Bunnies....

Lucky for Harry, he is neutered, which means he went to the vet and had an operation to prevent him from making babies. Otherwise, pet rabbits set free in the wild can reproduce rapidly. They are able to have up to 10 litters a year, with up to 10 kits (babies) in each litter. How many bunnies would there be after one year? Two? This adds up quickly!

Adoption Match


